2. Assessment methods

For the purpose of professional accreditation, the University's Education Committee has approved a variation in Postgraduate (Taught) Examination Conventions to the effect that a candidate who passes all core modules and fails up to 20 credits of non-core modules is recommended, as of right, for the award of a Pass in an appropriate Master's degree or Postgraduate Diploma, provided that no mark is below 40 and the weighted average mark for all modules and all non-modular aggregated assessment is at least50.

3. Other

Candidates may select alternative taught modules to those listed above to a maximum of 20 credits with the approval of the Degree Programme Director and subject to timetabling constraints.

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
