#### Notes

- (i) These programme regulations should be read in conjunction with the University's Taught Programme Regulations.
- (ii) A core module is a module which a student must pass.
- (iii) A compulsory module is a module which a student is required to study.
- (iv) All modules are delivered in Linear mode unless stated otherwise as Block, eLearning or distance learning.

#### 1. Programme structure

- (a) The programme is available for study in both full-time and part-time modes. The part-time route will be decided in consultation with the Degree Programme Director.
- (b) The period of study for full-time mode shall be one year starting in September. The period of study for part-time mode shall normally be two years starting in September. Part-time students will agree their programme of study with the Degree Programme Director.
- (c) The programme comprises modules to a credit value of 180 (at least 150 credits of which must be at level 7).
- (d) All candidates shall take the following compulsory modules:

- (e) In consultation with the Degree Programme Director, a further 20 credits must be taken in semester 2. Candidates may select one of the semester 2 History MA modules listed below:

Or candidates may select 20 credits from within the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences. These 20 credits could consist of an MA module from within the School of History, Classics and Archaeology; continuation of language study, or an MA module from within the Faculty.\*

This must be an MA module except in the case of language study, which may be at undergraduate level if appropriate, but must not take the student below 150 credits of level 7.

*\* In the case where a candidate has a particular interest in ancient/classical medicine and will devote his/her dissertation to this area, the student may, at the discretion of the Degree Programme Director, take the Classics CAC8000 Research skills and Development module instead.*

## **3. Progress**

Candidates are normally expected to pass the taught modules before proceeding to the dissertation, subject to the Examination Convention which allows candidates to graduate with up to 20 credits of non-core module failures.
