Notes:

- These programme regulations should be read in conjunction with the University's Postgraduate (Taught) Progress Regulations and Examination Conventions.*
- A core module is a module which a student must pass; such modules are designated by the board of studies as essential for study in a further module or to the granting of an award.*
- Unless otherwise stated under 'Type', modules are not core*
- A compulsory module is a module which a student must take. All optional modules are offered subject to the constraints of the timetable and to any restrictions on the number of students who may be taught on a particular modules.*

#### 1. Programme structure

- Candidates will initially apply for MA Archaeology (4089F/P) but may chose a specialist route and graduate with a named award as indicated above. Within its overall framework, the MA in Archaeology takes the form of one of six specialist pathways (listed above) and a generic route.
- With the approval of the Degree Programme Director and depending upon the academic background of the candidate, a pathway route will be chosen upon registration although preference may be shown during the admissions process of the route a candidate wishes to choose.
- The programme is available for study in both full-time and part-time modes. The part-time route will be decided in negotiation with the Degree Programme Director.
- The period of study for full-time mode shall be one year starting in September. The period of study for part-time mode shall normally be two years starting in September. Part-time students will agree their programme of study with the Degree Programme Director.

(e) The programme comprises modules to a credit value of 180 (or 190, if the candidate takes 40 credits of sub-level 7 credits as language options).

(f) Candidates on all routes shall take the following compulsory modules:

(h) **4089F/P MA Archaeology** Candidates wishing to remain on 4089F/P MA Archaeology shall take their remaining credits from any of the modules available below.

Candidates wishing to follow one of the routes shall take a minimum of 60 and a maximum of 100 credits from the modules specified for each route. For those taking 60 or 80 credits from these routes the remaining credits may be made up from other modules offered on other pathways or from the list under (h), and from the list under (i). Students pursuing a named route are expected to do their dissertation in that area.

Students may take two but not all of the following, ARA8106, ARA8107 and ARA8108.

*Modules marked \* are evaluated at Level 7 (MA Level) but are special subjects co-taught with students at Level 6 (final undergraduate stage). MA students taking these modules have separate assignments which are benchmarked and assessed at Level 7. A **maximum of two** of these modules may be taken as part of the programme. Students who have previously*

*taken an undergraduate version of this module for credit at Newcastle University shall not be allowed to take the MA module as part of their MA programme.*

For candidates taking Greek or Latin language, the choice of module(s) shall depend on their level of experience in the relevant language at entry. This shall be determined by the relevant Greek/Latin staff, in consultation with the candidate and usually with the help of a (non-binding) diagnostic test. Candidates must take the Part 1 module before taking the Part 2 module.

In modern languages, students may take: any modern language at level A, B, or C depending on their prior experience. Students must take both semester modules for Level A, or the 'full year' version of the module for levels B and C. Languages available include Chinese, French, German, Japanese, Portuguese and Spanish.

- j) Students undertaking 40 credits of sub-Level 7 language modules require a further 10 Level 7 credits in order to meet the threshold of 150 Level 7 credits required for a Masters degree in the UK. Those students must take the following module in Semester 2 that will allow them to apply their language skills (of whatever ability) to the needs of their academic programme. It is only to be taken by students registered for 40 credits of ancient or modern languages.
