1. Programme Structure

- (a) The programme is available for study in both full-time and part-time modes.
- (b) The period of study for full-time mode shall be one year starting in September. The period of study for part-time mode shall normally be 2 years starting in September. Part-time module choices can be discussed with the DPD with reference to the MA Degree Handbook.
- (c) The Masters programme comprises modules to a credit value of 180.
- (d) Candidates shall take a minimum of 50 credits and a maximum of 70 credits per semester.
- (e) All candidates shall take the following compulsory modules to the value of 140 credits:
