<b>10 Programme Aims</b>
<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. To offer a research environment in which students can learn from knowledgeable staff, their own study, and interaction with other students</li> <li>2. To equip students with the conceptual and analytical skills needed to achieve an advanced knowledge and understanding of their chosen field.</li> <li>3. To develop students' skills in undertaking and completing self-designed research papers and dissertations</li> <li>4. To provide a conversion course for students whose undergraduate degree is not in any of the areas covered by these MA degree programmes</li> <li>5. To produce graduates who, if suitably qualified, will be capable of embarking upon research degrees in their chosen field.</li> <li>6. To produce graduates capable of successfully pursuing careers in government agencies, business, the media and other areas where an advanced knowledge and understanding of their chosen field is needed or desirable</li> <li>7. To meet the needs of stakeholders</li> <li>8. To provide a programme which meets the FHEQs requirements of level 7</li> <li>9. To comply with prevailing University policies and QAA codes of practice</li> </ol>

<b>11 Learning Outcomes</b>  The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, qualities, skills and other attributes in areas relevant and specific to the degree programme and more broadly social science methods and methodologies; international and regional studies; politics topics; independent learning; cooperative group work; individual presentations skills.
<b>Knowledge and Understanding</b>
On completing the programme students should: <p><b>A1</b> Have an advanced knowledge and understanding of their chosen field</p> <p><b>A2</b> Have knowledge of approaches and methods in social science research and of the techniques required to carry out advanced research</p> <p><b>A3</b> Have a foundation of specialist knowledge and research skills from which they can embark upon careers with significant international dimensions or pursue a postgraduate research degree in their chosen field</p> <p><b>A4</b> Understand the theoretical basis of research in their chosen field</p>
<b>Teaching and Learning Methods</b>
The primary means of imparting knowledge and understanding is seminars (A1-A4). Throughout the programme students are strongly encouraged to engage in independent reading for which they are given extensive support and guidance on reading materials and their appropriate use. Students are strongly supported by staff in their completion of self-designed research projects.
<b>Assessment Strategy</b>
Knowledge and understanding are primarily assessed by research projects which are designed to assess theoretical and conceptual understanding and the capacity of students to relate knowledge through case studies and other empirically focused projects (A1-A4).
<b>Intellectual Skills</b>
On completing the programme students should be able to: <p><b>B1</b> Synthesise information from a variety of primary and secondary sources</p> <p><b>B2</b> Analyse, evaluate and interpret the principal source materials for their chosen field</p> <p><b>B3</b> Plan, conduct and communicate research through research papers</p> <p><b>B4</b> have the theoretical and practical skills that will enable them to successfully complete an MA dissertation.</p>
<b>Teaching and Learning Methods</b>
Cognitive skills are developed through seminars (B1-B2), research projects (B2-B3, B4) and through working with the supervisors of their research projects and dissertations (B3). Students are encouraged to develop cognitive skills through analysis of case studies (B1), independent reading and designing research projects (B2-B4).
<b>Assessment Strategy</b>
Intellectual skills are examined through research papers and the MA dissertation (B1-B4).
<b>Practical Skills</b>
On completing the programme students should be able to:

<b>C1</b> Critically evaluate key arguments <b>C2</b> Critically evaluate the most important texts and themes <b>C3</b> Present a reasoned and informed position both in writing and in spoken presentations <b>C4</b> Identify, locate, and retrieve scholarly and other materials relevant to their degree
<b>Teaching and Learning Methods</b>
<p>Critical skills are developed through independent reading and encouraging active participation individually and in groups in seminar settings (C1-C3). Formal spoken presentations (C3) and written research projects (C1-C4) are informed by appropriate materials some of which references are provided to students and others of which students have to locate.</p>
<b>Assessment Strategy</b>
<p>Practical skills are assessed through research projects (C1-C4).</p>
<b>Transferable/Key Skills</b>
<p>On completing the programme students should be able to:</p> <p><b>D1</b> Take responsibility for his/her own learning and personal professional development  <b>D2</b> Manage time and prioritise tasks by working to deadlines  <b>D3</b> Communicate effectively to others when working in seminar group settings  <b>D4</b> Make effective use of appropriate resources including journals and other online materials</p>
<b>Teaching and Learning Methods</b>
<p>Student self learning and time and task management is encouraged in weekly seminars and one on one research supervision sessions (D1-D2). Communication is practiced in weekly seminars (D3). Students are directed to appropriate journals and provided information concerning appropriate internet usage (D4).</p>
<b>Assessment Strategy</b>
<p>Self-learning is assessed in the context of the timely submission of research projects (D1-D2). Effective use of electronic resources is assessed in the context of their analysis and correct presentation in research projects (D4).</p>
